WINTER SAVING EFFORTS

The City continues its water saving efforts and produced a sizable savings in the month of January. Current Conditions

- As a result of nine atmospheric river storms in late December and early January, the Oroville and San Luis reservoirs have gained a combined 1,620,000 acre-feet of water. That is roughly enough to provide water to 5.6 million households for a year.
- Statewide snowpack is 205 percent of average for this time of year. In the past three weeks of storms, the Sierra snowpack water content increased by 21.2 inches of water, which is 80 percent of the water contained in a full seasonal snowpack. This data comes from the state's automated snow sensor network, and we will get a clearer picture of the statewide snowpack in the weeks ahead with aerial snow survey flights and manual surveys.
- These storms have not ended the drought. While the winter season has started impressively, an important measurement will be April 1 when the snowpack is typically at its highest. This is a time for cautious optimism, as uncertainty remains about what the remainder of the season may bring. A return to dry weather could wipe out some of the recovery we've had this year.
- Conditions may yet change dramatically, as we saw last winter. October and December 2022 brought powerful storms, but the bounty of those storms was offset by weather in January, February, and March that was the driest for those months on record.
- California is taking advantage of the runoff of nine atmospheric rivers that reached California in late December and early January to raise storage above and below ground. Those storms built the Sierra Nevada snowpack to above-average levels, which should also improve water storage levels when the snow melts this spring.
- "California's Water Supply Strategy, Adapting to a Hotter, Drier Future" aims to expand supplies by 1.6 million acre-feet by 2030, in addition to creating more than 3 million acre-feet of new storage. The strategy intensifies state focus on supply actions in the 2020 Water Resilience Portfolio and also invites the Legislature to help modernize regulatory processes to deliver projects faster.

The California Drought Update is a weekly roundup of conditions, state actions and upcoming developments. It is produced by an interagency team that includes the California Natural Resources Agency, the California Environmental Protection Agency, the Governor's Office of Emergency Services, the California Department of Food and Agriculture, the Department of Water Resources, the Department of Fish and Wildlife, the State Water Resources Control Board and the Department of Public Health. LITHIUM-ION BATTERIES



In today's technology driven world, lithium-ion batteries are powering electric vehicles, cell phones, e-bikes, laptops, toys, smoke alarms and power tools. These batteries can be dangerous if they overheat, and can cause a fire or explosion. Keep yourself and your family safe by keeping these safety tips in mind.



According to the Data Bridge Market Research, global lithium-ion battery market was valued at 6.70 billion in 2021 and is expected to reach 26.28 billion by 2029.

Lithium-ion battery fires can:

- Emit toxic gasses within seconds
- Burn hotter and faster than others
- Can't be smothered like other fires
- Can cause explosions within seconds
- An extinguished fire can reignite up to 21 days later!

Safety Tips

- Purchase batteries that are listed by a Nationally Recognized Testing Lab (NRTL)
- Know the manufacturer instructions and safety information for use, storage, charging and maintenance
- Never overload your outlet when charging any device with a lithium-ion battery
- · Never place the batteries in direct sunlight or a hot vehicle
- Store batteries in a cool, dry location

Charging and disposal

- Charge the device properly and only with the cords that came with the device
- Unplug the device once it is fully charged
- Do not charge batteries when the environment is below freezing (32F) or too hot (130F)
- Never charge the device under a pillow, on your bed or on a couch.Keep lithium-
- ion batteries away from combustible materials when charging.
- Never throw lithium-ion batteries in the trash
- Contact your local recycling center or waste management department for proper disposal
- Do not put discarded batteries together in a container or pile

Warning signs

- Unusual odor
 - Change in color
 - Too hot to the touch
 - Change in shape
 - Not keeping a charge
 - Smoking or sparking when plugging in
 - Unusual Noises (popping, hissing, buzzing)
 - Leaking of liquid

If you have a fire from a lithium-ion battery

- Leave the area immediately as the batteries give off toxics gasses and burn extremely hot, with explosions occurring in seconds
- Call 9-1-1
- DO NOT try to fight or extinguish the fire

SEAL BEACH POLICE CITIZENS' ACADEMY

SEAL BEACH, CA. – The Seal Beach Police Department will be hosting a Citizens' Academy beginning in March 2023.

The Citizens' Academy was developed to provide the public with an understanding of law enforcement's role in the community. This ten-week program offers an overview of the Seal Beach Police Department's structure, philosophy, operations, and services. Through hands-on demonstrations and exercises, participants will experience a variety of activities that police officers deal with on a daily basis. They will also have the opportunity to go on ride-alongs with Seal Beach officers.

The Citizens' Academy will meet one night a week for ten consecutive weeks. Each session will be held at the Seal Beach Police Department on Wednesday evenings from 6:00 PM to 9:45 PM. The class dates are March 29th, April 5th, April 12th, April 19th, April 26th, May 3rd, May 10th, May 17th, May 24th, and May 31st. There will be a graduation ceremony on the tenth week of the Citizens' Academy. Each participant will receive a graduation certificate and a special souvenir from the department.

The information covered during each week's session will help the community gain knowledge of police operations, units, procedures, and protocols. The expectations of the Citizens' Academy are to develop a stronger relationship between the community and police department, and to make Seal Beach an even safer city.



The curriculum is designed to be an overview of the police department and is not intended to serve as training for a career in law enforcement. Topics include:

- Seal Beach Police Department Organizational Structure / Chain of Command
- Roles in Law Enforcement
- Ethics and Police Professionalism
- Detective Bureau / Criminal Investigations
- Narcotics and DUI Investigations
- Police Canines
- Use of Force
- Patrol Operations and Traffic Stops
- Shoot / Don't Shoot Scenarios
- Traffic Enforcement and Collision Investigation
- Shooting Range and Firearms Training
- CPR Certification
- Coroner Investigations
- Orange County Fire Authority Presentation
- · Seal Beach Marine Safety / Lifeguards Presentation
- Trauma Intervention Program (TIP) Presentation

The Citizens' Academy is open to a maximum of 18 participants at this time, with future academy sessions being considered. In order to participate in the Citizens' Academy, applicants must be at least 18 years of age, live or work in Seal Beach, and must not have any misdemeanor or felony convictions. Selection procedures require completion of an application, modified personal history statement, and a criminal background check. After completion of the selection process, applicants will be mailed a confirmation letter indicating acceptance into the program and other details.

Chief Michael Henderson shared, "The Citizens' Academy is one of our favorite ways to invite the community to the police department so that they can learn about what we do. We encourage anyone who has an interest to apply."
