Girl Scouts Complete Project in Windsurf Park

On March 4th Seal Beach Girl Scout Troop 2966 completed their Gold Project in the Windsurf Park located adjacent to the First Street Parking Lot. The project included planting new pollinating plants that will attract bees and butterflies to the area. Staff worked with the Girl Scouts on this project for the past three months to identify the best species of plants, where to place the plants and how to source them. Sunday's planting event was attended by several other Girl Scout Troops that helped to complete the work.



Marina Basketball Courts Resurfaced

As part of the annual court resurfacing project, the Marina Basketball courts were refinished on March 7th. The court was ground to remove cracks and received a new coat of sport court surfacing.

Boardwalk Wall Repair

Emergency repairs are taking place on the Seal Way Boardwalk wall. Sections of the existing wall have reached their useful life and are being replaced. Climate and weather conditions detracted from the wall's usefulness. This repair is expected to take a month with weather permitting. During this project, sections of the wall subject to failure will also be addressed as it is inspected. Shown below, crews have removed a section of wall in immediate need of repair. Protective measures are in place to ensure no debris or materials get mixed into the existing beach sands.



Sand Berm Removal

The City's Winter Sand Berm is scheduled to be taken down for the Spring and Summer seasons. The berm is built to an engineered plan which describes the height, width, length and shape. The plan was based upon a coastal engineering study, which provides recommendations to the City on how and when to build the berm to best protect the City against storm wave run up during the most critical times of the year. The City's contractor is set to begin the removal process on Monday, March 19, 2018 and complete the work within two weeks. Lifeguard crews will assist to keep beach patrons safe throughout this process.

Household Hazardous Waste

Leftover products that are corrosive, toxic, or can catch fire, react, or explode under certain circumstances are considered household hazardous waste. These products require care to prevent fire, injury, or pollution of the environment.

Household hazardous waste includes cleaning products, aerosol cans, pesticides, batteries, paint, lighter fluid, and gasoline.

Use and Storage

- Keep flammable liquids away from heat sources and open flames, such as hot water heaters and fireplaces.
- Don't smoke while using any type of flammable product, including nail polish, polish remover, alcohol-based hair products, and similar cosmetic items.
- Follow instructions on the labels of all flammable liquids and other hazardous products carefully to prevent accidents or injuries at home.
- Keep hazardous household products in their original containers, and never remove labels or instructions.
- Never mix hazardous products. They might react, ignite, or explode when combined.

Disposal

- Never dispose of household hazardous waste in your regular trash. Once in landfills, these products can contaminate groundwater that may become a source of drinking water.
- Never dump household hazardous waste on the ground, down storm drains, or into toilets, drains, or sinks. It can seep into groundwater and waterways, contaminate lakes, the ocean, and local beaches.
